A first prize of \$2,500 is being offered. Up to two honorable mention awards of \$1,000 may also be given.

The Institute supports and conducts policy-relevant research on issues related to employment, unemployment, and social insurance programs. The dissertation award furthers this mission. The dissertation may come from any academic discipline, but it must have a substantial policy focus.

Dissertations will be evaluated using the following criteria:

- Policy relevance
- Technical quality of the research
- · Clarity of writing and presentation

Any person whose dissertation has been accepted during the 24-month period from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2025 is eligible for the 2025 prize. The deadline for submission is July 19, 2025. Applicants must upload a 10-page summary of the dissertation, CV, and a letter of endorsement from their dissertation advisor at:

Applicants are advised that they will need to supply a copy of their entire dissertation if they are selected as a finalist, and they may apply for the award only once.
